FARM TABLE FOUNDATION BRINGING COMMUNITY TO THE TABLE



In 2019, the St. Croix Valley Foundation provided funding to the Farm Table Foundation in support of a children’s yoga program. **With a county-wide obesity rate of 30% and limited opportunities for free wellness activities in the area, the yoga program was very well-received.** Over 350 children participated in over 20 yoga sessions. The program provided participants with mindfulness about health, the food that fuels their bodies, and the natural world that provides that food.

“We try to offer people many avenues to experience local food culture,” explained Laura Phoenix, Farm Table Foundation’s Executive Director. “In addition to the yoga classes, we provided kids with meal coupons to invite them and their families into the restaurant.” When weather cooperated, yoga sessions were held on the restaurant’s patio or on the Ice Age Trail, further introducing families to a local fitness resource. The Farm Table Foundation partnered with Amery Schools and Amery Community Education to promote the children’s yoga experience.

Farm Table Foundation engages the broader community through classes on hunting, foraging, baking, and preserving as well as showcasing its organic farm partners through farm tours and education.

A large sign near the front of the restaurant reads, “Shake the hand that feeds you.” This sums up Farm Table Foundation’s commitment to community-building. By encouraging people to think locally, focus on healthy lifestyles, and participate with others, Farm Table Foundation has created space and opportunity for people to gather together, learn and break bread.

Farm to Table



In Polk County, the Farm Table Foundation occupies a key spot on Amery’s Keller Avenue. However, the value of Farm Table Foundation’s Amery setting is less location, location, location and more mission, mission, mission. The Farm Table restaurant has had an Amery presence since 2014, and since 2017 it has been a major component of the Farm Table Foundation, a 501c3 nonprofit organization dedicated to growing local food culture through education, research and training.

Developing and sharing its locally-sourced, sustainable, earth-friendly food is at the heart of Farm Table Foundation’s community outreach initiatives. Farm Table Foundation strives to invite people in to its local food culture through a variety of classes, community events and the restaurant.

ENDOWED FUNDS CREATE IMPACT

When making an endowed gift to the SCVF or one of its ten affiliates, donors know their gift will take care of the communities they love for generations to come. Donors interested in a broader impact may contribute to an endowed *Unrestricted Fund*, providing the flexibility to respond to the changing needs of the region. St. Croix Valley Foundation Founding Board Chair John Baird talks with current Board Chair Sue Gerlach about the Foundation's history and future as well as the impact of the *Forever We Are Stronger* endowment campaign. The campaign aims to increase unrestricted endowed funds, which can be directed by the board to wherever need is greatest.

In 1995, a group of committed citizens with a vision for the St. Croix Valley were gathered in a basement conference room in Stillwater. Everyone around that table saw opportunity in the St. Croix Valley. And they knew that people who had the capacity to make significant charitable gifts, as well as the civic and philanthropic nature to do so, needed a local foundation to execute the goals being discussed.

"Before we entered the picture there were only a couple of funders that could support projects in this area," recalled John Baird. "And the path to their door was becoming a deep trench from everyone treading the same ground to those limited funding sources."

The newly created St. Croix Valley Community Foundation (now known as the St. Croix Valley Foundation) would be a nonprofit organization that could accept charitable donations, invest funds for the long term, and manage impact-producing grants back to the community.

By the time that basement meeting wrapped up, John Baird had a new role. As he tells it, "I was sitting at the end of the conference room table. When talk of leadership came up someone said, 'Well, you're at the head of the table, John - so I think you may as well be chairman.'" The group had a great deal of respect for John's leadership, his keen understanding of the Valley and his vision for what a community foundation could accomplish in this region. John Baird became St. Croix Valley Community Foundation's first board chair.

Fast forward 25 years. John is still a commanding presence at any table and still talks passionately about the St. Croix Valley Foundation's role in this region. From the beginning, the Foundation aimed to become a locally-supported, locally-managed funding source for projects that would enhance the quality of life throughout the Valley.

That mission still drives today's board, led by Sue Gerlach, and it remains the driving force behind the "Together We Are Stronger" endowment campaign. Today the Foundation has nearly \$70 million in philanthropic assets under management. While that growth is impressive, the majority of that funding is designated by donors for specific projects and uses.

The 'Together We Are Stronger' endowment campaign has been raising unrestricted funds that can be distributed by the board to address pressing needs in the region. The endowed nature of campaign gifts means this unrestricted funding source will be available forever.

John explained his support for the campaign on a recent visit. "Gifts to the endowment campaign provide the funding that the board can use to address the more complex issues facing our region."

"The best way for St. Croix Valley Foundation to honor the vision and commitment of its founders is by focusing on the future," notes current board chair Sue Gerlach. "Endowment campaign funding means we can continue to impact this region long into the future - a future where needs still exist but so do the means to address them."

HELPING NONPROFITS BUILD CAPACITY

Presentations were also hosted in other communities to allow the greatest number of nonprofit leaders the opportunity to attend.

Gary's 42-year career has been focused on assisting nonprofit, philanthropic, educational and governmental organizations to work smarter and become stronger. In addition to consulting work via Gary Kelsey & Associates, he is Senior Core Faculty and Ph.D. Academic Residency Coordinator for Walden University.

Enhancing the quality of life in the St. Croix Valley is the core of St. Croix Valley Foundation's mission. In order to be successful in this undertaking, the SCVF proudly partners with hundreds of nonprofit agencies, volunteers and donors.

That is why, in addition to encouraging individual philanthropy to respond to the needs of the Valley, the SCVF has a long history of providing leadership, guidance and support to area nonprofit organizations. A SCVF program called Consultants in Service, or C.I.S., is a powerful example of support to nonprofits.

C.I.S. utilizes volunteer professionals who share specific skills, tools and knowledge with area nonprofits, especially smaller organizations with operating budgets under \$500,000. C.I.S. volunteers provide these nonprofits with valuable expertise, strategic insights and fresh perspectives.

Consulting services may include board member recruitment and training, budgeting and marketing and strategic planning. By helping nonprofit staff and board members tackle these critical topics, C.I.S. volunteers help these organizations build capacity, positioning them for a bigger impact in local communities.

St. Croix Valley Foundation board member Dr. Gary Kelsey helped design and launch the C.I.S. program in 2017. The skills Gary brings to the C.I.S. program are well-suited to the needs of area nonprofits.

Gary's vision for the C.I.S. program remains three-fold:

- Help nonprofits address the needs of the St. Croix Valley
- Engage volunteer consultants in projects that utilize their invaluable skills
- Provide volunteers a unique opportunity to make a difference in the communities they love

Ultimately, it is this love for the Valley – continually demonstrated by volunteers, partners and donors – that drives every program of the St. Croix Valley Foundation.

THE MALMQUIST SCHOLARSHIP

FOR STUDENTS OF STILLWATER HIGH SCHOOL

Through the Malmquist Scholarship,

Gary and Mary Malmquist are helping young people from the Stillwater area capture the benefits of education and the rewards of opportunity.

The process of establishing the scholarship began when the Malmquists were guests at the Stillwater Area Community Foundation's 2014 spring celebration. It was there that they learned more about the relationship between Stillwater Area Community Foundation as a local affiliate of the St. Croix Valley Foundation (which serves and supports a broader 6 county area). Gary recalled his initial assessment, "We were impressed by the structure of locally-focused community foundations able to utilize the professional staff, resources, expertise and oversight of the St. Croix Valley Foundation."

As the Malmquists discovered, the St. Croix Valley Foundation has ample experience with scholarship management. St. Croix Valley Foundation manages \$7.8 million from 57 unique scholarship funds. Last year alone 166 students were awarded nearly \$250,000.

The Malmquists utilized that expertise to establish an endowed scholarship fund that would meet their goals and their hopes for scholarship recipients. "We did our research, but we still had a lot of questions," recalled Gary. "The staff at St. Croix Valley Foundation helped guide us in the process and helped us make good decisions based on our goals for the scholarship."

The \$20,000 Malmquist Scholarship (\$5,000/year renewable for 4 years) was established in the summer of 2014 with the first recipient selected in 2015. Malmquist Scholarship recipients show academic ability, personal character and family financial need. The scholarship is for students of Stillwater Area High School who wish to pursue education at a public university, trade school or community college in Minnesota or Wisconsin.

A subcommittee of the Stillwater Area Community Foundation Board, including the Malmquists, make the annual recipient selection. Annual payments of \$5,000 are then made from the scholarship fund to the qualifying institution, each year for four years, on behalf of the recipient. With a new recipient selected annually, and past recipients continuing to receive funds for 4 years, this scholarship supports 4 Stillwater students' educational goals at any one time. And the endowed nature of the Malmquist Scholarship Fund ensures that this scholarship program will continue forever.

St. Croix Valley Foundation manages \$7.8 million from 57 unique scholarship funds. New scholarships can be established with \$25,000 endowed. The minimum scholarship distribution is \$1,000 annually.



Books, periodicals, card catalogs and shhhh-ing librarians conjure an image of a public library from yesteryear. Today, in communities up and down the St. Croix Valley, public libraries are meeting community needs in creative new ways. Local community foundations are partnering with town libraries to address community needs and create entirely new reasons to ‘visit your local library.’

Thanks to a grant from the Northwest Alliance Community Foundation (an affiliate of St. Croix Valley Foundation), residents in Luck, Wisconsin can walk into the Luck Public Library and check out a bicycle with helmet, tire pump and other gear. The bike check-out program provides residents (who may not have access to a bike) the opportunity to experience one of the area’s premier outdoor resources – the Gandy Dancer State Trail.

The Friends of Gandy Dancer State Trail requested funding from the Northwest Alliance Community Foundation to provide bikes and gear for the Luck Public Library. The goal of the Friends group is to get local community members connected to the trail – to see its value, nurture it as a resource and create an opportunity for biking-related economic development. The Luck Public Library was happy to serve as a conduit between the *increase use and access* goals of the Friends of Gandy Dancer State Trail and the recreational equipment needs of area residents.

Northwest Alliance Community Foundation board members recognized the opportunity to support this unique partnership between library and trail resource –

and provided grant funding for the bikes and equipment.

Another example of an unconventional partnership between library and community foundation comes from the River Falls Community Foundation.

When it is cold and snowy in River Falls, there is now an indoor place for kids to play, learn, explore, blow off steam and just have fun together. No shhhh-ing. It is called The Big Fun Lab and thanks to a \$10,000 Big Idea Grant from the River Falls Community Foundation (an affiliate of the St. Croix Valley Foundation) it is a new wintertime fixture of the River Falls Public Library.

Library staff had created a modest version of the play space last year and the response was so enthusiastic that staff began imagining a bigger, better, more permanent version of the play-learn-explore concept.

The Big Fun Lab takes inspiration from hands-on exhibits found at children’s museums and STEM-focused play/puzzle games popular with older children. For parents and caregivers, The Big Fun Lab is a place to connect, form bonds and share information about other community resources.

Both of these projects highlight the ongoing, yet evolving role libraries play in communities throughout the St. Croix Valley. Thanks to local community foundations’ commitment to collaborative, impactful grantmaking, these two libraries – and libraries throughout the Valley – are meeting community needs in ways no one from the era of the card catalog would ever have imagined.

Nonprofit organizations establish funds to take advantage of SCVF expertise in accepting complex gifts, investment protocols, and economies of scale, creating a long-term funding source for their programs, capital or operating needs.


